Rejoice not at the Enemies' Suffering

Earlier this year, we celebrated Shabbat Shirah and chanted the special trope for one of the most ancient texts in the Torah, the Song by the Sea. The opening line of the song is, "I will sing to Adonai, for God has triumphed gloriously; Horse and driver God has hurled into the sea (Ex. 15:1). This verse celebrates the drawing of the Egyptian army into the Sea of Reeds. During these last few weeks, as we followed the story of the oppression of our ancestors by a Pharaoh "who did not know Joseph," there is no doubt that the celebration of finally being free is guite fitting.

The Torah is not explicitly troubled about the moral implications of celebrating our enemies' destruction, which would come centuries later when our ancient sages felt somewhat uneasy with the celebration. The Talmud contains this famous interpretation: "As Rabbi Shmuel bar Nahman teaches, Rabbi Yonatan says: [...] At that time, the ministering angels desired to recite a song before the Holy One, Blessed be God. The Holy One told them, "My handiwork (i.e., the Egyptians) are drowning in the sea, and you are reciting a song before Me?" (Talmud Sanhedrin 39b)

To be clear, this commentary does not explicitly forbid rejoicing at the downfall of one's enemies, but rather, it indicates that God is the creator of all and cares for all creation. Another expression of the ambivalence we should experience when witnessing the suffering of those who wish us harm is found in the Seder. As we read the list of ten plagues, many of us observe the tradition of spilling one drop of wine from our second cup. We explain this practice by saying that our joy is diminished as we remember the suffering of the Egyptians, who, like many people until this day, suffered on account of their leaders' decisions.

Like most important ethical problems faced with intellectual honesty, in its wisdom, our tradition challenges us to consider conflicting values when thinking about using violent means, something which the IDF code of ethics actively does. In Judaism, there are conflicting opinions on whether to celebrate the death of one's enemy. It is not a black-and-white decision. I am proud of the notion that we Jews don't throw parties when our enemies are vanquished. Think about the festivals of Hanukkah and Purim, which, like Passover, imply the defeat of those who were determined to destroy Judaism. Instead of celebrating that we won and they lost, we focus on our survival. It might be a fine point, but we celebrate that we are still here and not that our enemies were defeated.

Israel still faces serious threats from its neighbors — both regionally and locally — and we need to be outspoken about Israel's security, stressing that we respect and value Israel's right to self-preservation and its attempt to do everything in its power to bring the hostages back home.

At the same time, as we continue to live with the dire consequences of October 7th, both in Israel and Gaza, we should be proud of our great humanitarian tradition, remembering that we do not celebrate the suffering of even our worst enemies. We can be both compassionate and proud of our moral and military strength. Am yisrael chai.
